A LETTER FROM REV CLINTON

Dear Friends.

Back in our first pastorate in Marion, Kansas, the world seemed a kindlier place to raise children and welcome in each new year. Most businesses were closed on Sunday. Wednesday nights were left unscheduled so that churches could offer their children's programs. Football games on Friday nights included regular opportunities for prayer (which I led on several occasions). And there were no ordinances prohibiting the ringing of church bells! Each Christmas Eve after the 11:00 pm service, I would walk down the aisle to the belfry rope and ring in the birthday of Jesus. And on New Year's Eve as the clock turned twelve, many bells could be heard ringing all across town.

Times have changed over the past three decades. Small-town lifestyles are slipping away. Nowadays, businesses are open 24/7, school events are scheduled "whenever"--and if a coach offers to pray before a contest—an out-of-state organization just might sue.

Many of you feel that these are signs of our society's demise. Indeed, they point to an America that is increasingly less "Christian," which the Pew Report on Religion in America (2015) clearly reveals. Yet for my part, I worry more about the growing gap between rich and poor, diminishing social services, burgeoning gun-violence and the politics of fear. These are not new problems. In the past, the church has sought to alleviate these things. It still needs to do so today.

Here in Naperville as we enter a brand-new year, our churches may not have bells in our belfries like Kansas. But we can still find ringing joy in our hearts. At no time in history has the call of Christ been easy—for it has never been a call to complacency or to "business as usual." The call of Christ is to hear and move towards—the sound of a new creation where the pealing laughter of children will drown out the sound of semiautomatics and clear harmonies of peace rinse clean the clamor of hate.

Only love can bring such music to pass. In truth, it is already audible. It can be heard wherever two or three are gathered in love's name. For our part, we name him Jesus, and in this brand-new year we must seek hear and follow His voice like sheep to their Shepherd, like bells on New Year's Day. With joy, Clinton

Knox Year-End Financial Update

"Thank You!"

Thanks to the generous support of our members and friends, it is estimated that Knox will finish 2015 approximately \$25,000 to the good. All expenses are paid, including 100% of our commitments to our mission partners. Knox's Capital Reserve currently sits at \$72,000. In further mission giving, the Session voted to provide \$20,000 to PCUSA Shared Mission, supporting mission work:

- in the Chicago Presbytery (such as the Dakota Partnership)
- the Synod (such as Kemmerer Village) and
- the General Assembly (such as Presbyterian World Mission)

The Mission Council at its December meeting also voted to provide \$3,000 to support two Presbyterian missionary couples serving in Thailand and South Sudan. The Congregation's support for One Great Hour of Sharing (Easter) and the Christmas Joy Offering supporting PCUSA's global and national missions totaled \$13,940. **Praise God from Whom all blessings flow!**

The Knox Congregation also gave generously in support of local mission initiatives, including Youth Go & Serve, Young Adult Mission Outreach and the Pastors' Discretionary Fund (supporting members and friends within our congregation facing need). \$54,900 was given and raised for Youth Go & Serve in 2015. \$20,200 was given and raised for the Young Adult Mission to Mexico. And \$64,500 was distributed from the Pastors' Discretionary Fund, leaving a balance of \$35,000 for 2016. Your gifts are changing lives and honoring Christ's command to "love your neighbor as yourself."

Knox members and friends have also pledged generously in support of the church in 2016. To date, 332 pledges have been made totaling \$1,219,066. This compares to 381 pledges totaling \$1,380,490 for 2015. We still have a way to go to meet the level of last year's giving. We hope this update gives you an idea of how your gifts are being used. Through your pledged support of Knox, together we can do more!



Epiphany Sunday Star Sunday - January 3

We love Star Sunday at Knox when we each choose a star during worship with a biblical word and a Knox family to pray for during the coming year. We love to hear the star stories shared by members of their insights and epiphanies which occurred during the past year. Don't let it whiz by this year! Plan to join us for worship on the 3rd.

The Star is a symbol of the guiding light which the 3 Magi followed from their distant home to the 'place where the baby lay'. It is the symbol associated with Christmas and with the Magi or Wise Men.

The celebration of Christmas has come to us filled with European and Christian influences. The days of celebration followed rather than preceded Christmas Day - hence the 12 days of Christmas. The celebrations concluded on Epiphany eve (also 12th Night), the recognition of the Wise Men. While we set up our Nativity sets with all the players present, there was actually quite a time lapse between the visit of the shepherds and the wise men.



Epiphany comes from the ancient Greek language which means 'sudden insight inspired by the divine'. To have an epiphany is to gain understanding, awareness and perhaps divine guidance. The 3 Wise Men signify the recognition of Jesus, the new king, coming for the whole world, including those who were not of Jewish background.

We continue to pray for Jesus to come into hearts and minds today around the world.

We are grateful for those men of old who traveled so far to offer their worship before the new born king. We are called to 'fall upon our knees' in reverence and worship, offering our treasures, as they did so long ago.

May this be a bright year of many insights and epiphanies for you!


